

Antique shops, general stores, clothing and specialty boutiques surround the courthouse square and are located throughout town.



Farmerville

Letter from the Mayor

Farmerville is the largest town and parish seat of Union Parish. It is located in the North Central region of the state, about 20 miles from Interstate 20, in the heart of Louisiana's "Sportsman's Paradise." The terrain is hilly and its pine trees grow tall.

Farmerville is considered a rural community, but it is a very friendly town with a population of 3,800 proud residents. Downtown you will find a well manicured Court House Square, shops, banks, office buildings, restaurants and a first class public library. Over the last several years, Farmerville has been expanding along Louisiana Highway 2, where you'll find shopping centers, big box retailers, and restaurants lining both sides of the street and is now expanding south on Hwy 33.

Fishing, water sports and hunting are five-star activities in Union Parish, whose pride and joy is beautiful Lake D'Arbonne, a 15,000-acre lake filled with bass, crappie, bream and catfish. Farmerville is also most fortunate to have Lake D'Arbonne State Park located just a short drive from town.

Many visitors come to the state park because of its clean, cozy cabins, RV accommodations, tennis courts, fishing piers, boat and canoe rentals, swimming pool, meeting rooms and pavilions. Another favorite with visitors is Lake D'Arbonne Country Club and Golf Course, sporting one of the bestgroomed 9-hole courses in the state.

In addition to retail, healthcare and education; timber, agriculture and recreation are the top industries here in Union Parish. Foster Farms chicken plant is by far the largest employer, providing some 1,300 jobs.

The premier festival salutes another mainstay of regional agriculture. The Louisiana Watermelon Festival is held the last weekend of July, and is hosted by the Farmerville Jaycees.

The people of Union Parish are a people of faith. Religion is a tradition that runs deep in its communities, and there is a wide variety of churches and denominations to accommodate your beliefs. You will not find it difficult to select a church and a congregation that you and your family will enjoy being a part of.

In the year 1790, the first grant of land in the territory of Union Parish was made by the Spanish government to a trapper, John Honeycutt. He settled in the land that was full of wildlife and ideal for his trade. After he had received his land grant, he began to eke out his living here with only Indians as his neighbors.

Then, one day a few years later, after he first entered this section, he met a roving band of Indians who told him of another family that had settled in this territory. Putting his coonskin cap on his head, and with his flint-lock in the crook of his arm, Honeycutt set out to follow the Indians' directions. He found an old settler by the name of Feazel with a "house full of girls." The story goes that he asked the father for the hand of one.

From Alabama, Georgia, and the Carolinas came the adventurers. Soon there were home sites along the Bayous D'Arbonne, Corny and DeLoutre, in the "Ouachita Settlements" section, as the Union Parish Territory was designated. Many coming from Alabama up the Ouachita River from Fort Miro to claim their future homes disembarked at the spot which became known as Alabama Landing, a name that still survives. A well-known location for fishing, boating and picnicking, it is about 25 miles east of Farmerville.

Not until 1839 was Union Parish created out of the northern part of Ouachita Parish, and in that year a town was laid out for the parish seat. There was some argument as to the name of the town. Matthew Wood, a first settler and president of the first police jury, donated the land, the highest spot in the parish, and many wanted to call it Woodville in his honor. Wood, however, did not wish this, and the town was named Farmerville after a family of that name, probably Miles Farmer, local planter and elder in the Baptist Church, who had helped organize the Concord Baptist Association in 1832. He was the father of J. N. Farmer, police juror and W. W. Farmer, the latter of whom was a surveyor, justice of peace, lawyer, and later lieutenant governor of the state. A monument was erected by the Louisiana Legislature in 1855, and it currently stands at his grave in the Farmerville Cemetery.

Although Farmerville was organized and plotted in 1839, it wasn't until the general assembly of 1842 that the town was granted a charter and incorporated. It operated under this charter with several amendments until the charter of 1870, under which the town operates today.

Marion is one of, if not the, oldest town in Union Parish and was settled by pioneers from Alabama and named after Marion, Alabama, which was the old hometown of Marion's first settlers.

The earliest known family was the David Stewart family. In 1832, they built a log cabin four miles south of present day Marion. Other early families were the Whittles, the Repponds, and the Briands. The greatest influx of settlers was in the 1830s. The first record of land sale was on June 13, 1839. The land was sold to Pascal Traylor by the United States Land Office for \$379. This area of land is now the center of town.

Other families before 1850 were the John Traylors, the Powells, the Larkins, the Georges, the Greens, the Lunsfords, the Adamses, the Cooks, the Hills, and the Thomases.

The Marion Post Office was originally opened on March 18, 1846. It was discontinued in 1867, then reopened in 1869. The Marion Post Office has operated continuously since 1869. Marion has many churches, the Methodists, the Baptist, Assembly of God, Marion Baptist and Steadfast Love Ministries. Marion State Bank was chartered on February 7, 1907. Marion State Bank has been serving customers with branches in Marion, Farmerville, Sterlington, Monroe and West Monroe. They have ATMs located in Marion, Farmerville,

Sterlington, Bernice and West Monroe. Marion State Bank has been "growing by helping others grow" for more than 100 years.

The Marion Mayhaw Festival began in 1982. The first sponsors were the Marion Jaycees. The 36th annual festival took place on May 12-13, Mother's Day weekend. The festival begins on Friday night with a street dance. Saturday's events include a parade followed by games and contests for children and adults. Each year there is a Mayhaw Jelly cooking contest as well as a treasure hunt. There is always plenty of good food and fun for everyone to enjoy at the Marion Mayhaw Festival.

Famous people from Marion include John David Crow who was born in Marion in July 1935 and was the Heisman Trophy winner in 1957 at Texas A&M as a running back/halfback. He also played professionally for Chicago/ St. Louis Cardinals from 1958-1964 and San Francisco 49ers from 1965-1968. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1976. He led the NFL in rushing average (5.9) and yards from scrimmage (1.533) in 1960.

Bobby Joe Douglas, a Marion High

graduate (1976-80), was a standout basketball player. During his four-year career he scored 4,070 points, which currently ranks 10th on the all-time national list. During the 1979 season, Douglas averaged 54 points per game. This still stands, a national high school record. That same year he scored 93 points in one game with the score ending 114-44.

George Harmon Smith is an internationally recognized novelist. His most successful book, "Bayou Boy," garnered 15 major awards and three of his books were made into movies. He was inducted into the Louisiana Historical Hall of Fame in 1983. His books are in the University Archives at Louisiana Tech University and Utah State University. He served three consecutive terms as Mayor of Marion and was also the principal of Marion High School.

Grady A. Dugas, M.D., was a Marion physician who invented the "Safer Automatic Wheelchair Wheel Locks," a patented device designed for those who sometimes forget to lock their wheelchairs. For four decades Dugas was engaged in a family medical practice in Marion.

Town of Bernice

Bernice is a small, vibrant community in North Central Louisiana with much to see and offer. With a population of 1,689 people,* the incorporated area is about three square miles.

Bernice, established in 1899, is located 15 miles south of the Arkansas state line in Union Parish. The business district is bisected by US Highway 167, North and South, and Louisiana Highway 2, East and West. Bernice is 20 miles north of Interstate 20 in Ruston. Louisiana.

Bernice, known as 'The Gateway to Union Parish and Lake D'Arbonne,' is in the heart of a recreational area, bound by 20,000 acres of lakes including Lake D'Arbonne, Lake Claiborne, and Corney Lake, as well as Lake D'Arbonne State Park, 10 miles, Lake Claiborne State Park, 13 miles, and Corney Creek Lake and Dam, 5 miles. The area is rich with natural resources such as excellent public and private hunting lands for deer, wild turkeys, squirrels, rabbits, ducks and feral hogs and fishing areas.

Bernice is also home of the Corney Creek Great Outdoor Festival every April. Bernice extends the invitation to visit the Bernice Depot Museum and Captain Henderson Caboose. Also, stop by the Town Hall to visit and have a cup of coffee. The Tourist Center is located directly beside the Town Hall.

Bernice also boasts a 160-acre industrial park complete with water, sewer, gas and three-phase electricity which is managed by the Bernice Industrial Development Corporation (BIDCO).

Bernice is also the hometown of former NBA basketball star Willis Reed, who starred at nearby Grambling State and the New York Knicks (1964-1974).

Reed was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. In 1997, he was voted one of the "50 Greatest Players in NBA History."

Bernice is also the birth place of A&E "Duck Dynasty" star Willie Robertson.

Village of Downsville

The Village of Downsville, established in the 1840s, is located in both Union and Lincoln parishes. The population as of the 2010 census was 143.

The quiet hamlet features clean, safe country living with quick access to the surrounding areas of Monroe, Ruston and Farmerville.

The main highways are 145 and 151 and the two top attractions are Bryan Park and Wild Wings shooting range.


Village of Spearsville

The main highways are La. 15 and 3121.





Known as "The Hopkins House"

(Circa 1850), was built by Reverend Elias George, a pioneer Baptist Minister. One of his servants, John Thomas, a master carpenter, selected highly skilled workers for the massive construction project. Their superior skills are still very evident today, for the old two-story house is still standing tall today 169 years later! The Hopkins House is a unique Caroline I style and listed on the

National Register of Historic Homes. Danny A. and Ann Smith have restored the old stately home and they absolutely love living in it and

enjoy exploring the spacious grounds! It was here that Anna Porter Harrison and her Mother boarded with the George family. Ms. Harrison taught school and Porter taught music. Porter fell in love with a local young man named Miles Goldsby. Soon afterwards, Ms. Harrison decided she and her daughter needed to leave Marion due to their courtship which often took place at dusk of day. As a result of their departure, Anna Porter left her heart behind and thus Inspired her to put to music an old poem. Immediately afterwards the popular ballad "In the Glooming" was born!

57th Annual Louisiana Watermelon Festival











July 24-25, 2020

Farmerville, LA

Founded by the Farmerville Jaycees in 1963, the Louisiana Watermelon Festival is held in Farmerville, Louisiana annually the last weekend in July.

The Watermelon Festival is celebrated each year as a way of promoting the watermelon industry and showing pride in their harvest.

Friday's events include a tennis tournament, bicycle and tricycle races, arm wrestling contest, watermelon eating and seed spitting contests, a best-dressed watermelon competition and a street dance. During these activities, arts and craft vendors, food and games are open on the Courthouse Square.

Events on Saturday begin with a breakfast for the growers entering their watermelons in the size and quality contests. Watermelons entered in the size contest are judged strictly on the basis of weight. The heaviest three watermelons in each category are then auctioned to the public. Quality contest watermelons are judged at the Union Parish Extension Service by measuring sugar content of the watermelons with a refractometer.

At 9 a.m. Saturday, the festival parade begins at the old Union Parish High School and travels down Main Street before circling a block and returning to the high school. All day, vendors are open on the Courthouse Square. The watermelon auction begins at 10 a.m. on the Courthouse Square. The Miss Louisiana Watermelon Festival contestants, along with reigning and visiting queens, greet the public beginning at noon.

Lessons from the past

Larce Holder leaves lasting legacy for Union Parish

Some people simply naturally seem larger than life. Late longtime Farmerville resident Larce Holder was one of those people — someone who will leave a lasting impression and legacy long after they're gone.

"He was like Forrest Gump and Indiana Jones all wrapped up into one person," said longtime friend Lisa Crow. "He could do anything and everything. We're talking about a man who earned a black belt in karate at the age of 60."

An outstanding outdoorsman, Holder found himself in a "Sportsman's Paradise" in the piney hills of Union Parish, and as someone known as "Farmerville's Renaissance Man," he spent much time molding young men into the kind of people and leaders our nation needs and preparing them for their lives ahead.

Holder, who passed away at the age of 98 on June 17, 2019, at the War Veterans Home in Monroe, was a self-made man. Born in 1921, Holder was only 8 years old when the Great Depression struck our country and taught him at a young age about the frugality that could become a cornerstone of his life and something he passed on to future generations that learned from him.

In the Army during WWII, Holder served in a cartography unit.

"He was a photographer, too, and I've seen pictures he took of bombs being dropped from bombers," Lisa Crow said.

This had a lasting effect on a creative mind from the hills of rural North Louisiana and helped turned Holder's passion for art and photography into a career. Following the war he used his GI bill to obtain an art degree from Louisiana Tech.

For many years Holder and his late wife Sadie, who died in 2018,

owned Creative Photo and Art Studio where Holder was a professional photographer and they both taught art classes.

In 1970 he started the art department at Cedar Creek School in Ruston and taught fine art and industrial art there for 21 years.

But art wasn't Holder's only passion. He also had a love for the outdoors and nature and passing that love on to the scouts that learned from him.

It was a love Holder learned at a young age himself. He attended the first-ever scout jamboree where he met the founder of the Boy Scouts, Lord Baden-Powell.

What he learned as a young scout stuck with Holder the rest of his life, and his association with mountain men of the past as well as Indians of a forgotten frontier went much farther than reading books and dreaming. Among his friends was Fred Bear, early archery pioneer and founder of Fred Bear Archery. Holder learned to walk the walk and live his life the way outdoorsmen like Bear did. That love of bow hunting he picked up a young age was passed on to his scouts, who would routinely go bow hunting on campouts under Holder's guidance.

Retired U.S. District Court judge Robbie James grew up in Farmerville and became an Eagle Scout under Holder's guidance.

"I knew all about Mr. Holder even before becoming a Boy Scout because I had two older cousins in scouting who talked about him all the time, and my father was also a friend of his.

"It was probably 10 or 15 years ago I was talking to someone about Mr. Holder and that person said that the thing that made Mr. Holder special is that he had a unique ability to relate to young people no matter who or what they were — rich or poor, smart or not so much so — he had that ability to make young people feel like they were heard."

James said one of the more fascinating things about Holder was the fact he knew so much about so many things.

"We all learned so much from him," James said. "In scouting, we had a topic he focused on every month. In January it might be astronomy because the clear and cold nights made for the best stargazing. In February it might be cooking learning how to bake breads while camping and that kind of thing. Then in March and April it might be camping. And during the summer of course it was things like aquatics and canoeing. He had so much knowledge and knew how to make you relate to it."

Another key quality James said Holder had was patience.

"He was a patient man willing to devote the time needed to really teach young people about things," James said. "It's funny, because so times other adults might have gotten a little frustrated talking

to Mr. Holder because he was very thorough explaining whatever it was he was talking about. He would patiently teach things, but you had to be a patient listener because he told you about all the intricacies and hows and whys. And sometimes other adults didn't have that kind of patience to be able to relate and learn from him."

Holder didn't only have much knowledge — he had many abilities, too.

"There's nothing he couldn't do with his hands. He was a great wood carver. He was a good carpenter. He worked on his own cars. He made his own bow and arrows.

"His grandfather had been a stone carver making gravestones and things like that, and Mr. Holder had that ability, too. That grandfather had some American Indian in him, too, and was a big influence on Mr. Holder. So Mr. Holder could chip flint and make his own arrowheads, too."

But despite all that knowledge and ability, James said Holder didn't get caught up in himself.

"Mr. Holder was a man of simple means," James said. "Very grounded and down to earth."

Holder also did much work on the homes he lived in.

"He did all the plumbing in the house we bought from him," John Crow said. "He was an amazing man - truly special."

Holder could also be somewhat of a pack rat.

"He never threw anything away," James said. "He kept a sling shot he had used as a young child. He kept the first fishing lure he ever had. He had all kinds of these little treasurers that fascinated many of us."

Holder's daughter Lenece Cavalier said her father was also blessed to have a foundation that kept him firmly grounded in everything he did — her mother, Sadie Nelson Holder, who was Holder's second wife.

"She was one of those strong southern women with a backbone of steel," Cavalier said. "They were very much a duo."

When Holder was Scoutmaster, Troop 16 ended its weekly meetings by closing with the Scout Prayer. Scouts formed a circle with their left hand on the right shoulder of the person next to them, right hands raised in the scout salute and heads bowed. One scout would lead off the prayer ...


"And Now,





That seems a fitting farewell for Farmerville's Renaissance man.









Crappie tourney deemed 'epic'

Tennessee duo reels in national championship

a horse race can be won by a nose, the American Crappie Trail National Championship held on Lake D'Arbonne March 28-30 was won by not much more than a fish scale.

The winning difference ended up being one one-hundredth of an ounce of crappie.

Tony Hughes and Jeff Riddle of Grossbeak, Tennessee, hauled in the national championship with the final stringer weighing 11.27 for a total of 35.94 pounds.

That edged the team of Daniel Porter of Missouri and Jeremy Aldridge of Mississippi, who weighed in the same number of fish at a total weight of 35.93.

Hughes and Riddle won cash

Riddle won cash and prizes, including a new fully rigged Ranger Z518 boat and Evinrude G2 150 motor worth \$50,750.

Porter and Aldridge earned \$8,300 in cash for their runners-up spot.

More than \$100,000 in cash and prizes — the biggest crappie tournament payout ever — went to the win-

ners, and the ACT Angler Team of the Year trophy was on the line, too. Sixteen states were represented in the tournament, including 15 teams from Louisiana.

"It was epic, just epic," ACT owner Matt Morgan said about the week to lakedarbonnelife.com.

"I mean, really, you know. You have a three-day crappie tournament with the best crappie fishermen around and at the end of the day, it's one one-hundredth of an ounce. Oh my. What else could you want? What can I say? It was epic."

The first day of the tournament started with 80 teams while the field was cut to 50 the second day. For

the final day on Saturday, only the top 25 teams survived to fish for the title.

Both the first- and second-place teams ended up moving to the same area later Saturday after not having much luck early on during the final round of fishing.

"We really thought we could catch

what we had the previous two days," Hughes said. "We had it planned out that we thought we could catch 12 pounds every day. But today started out where they wouldn't bite for us. We lost one big fish and we thought that was going be it. We lost it."

So then Hughes and Riddle moved to another area where they found Porter and Aldridge also fishing.

"We thought first of the week that maybe we could catch 13 or better per day but the fish started spawning out," Riddle said. "Where we fished (Saturday) was a little gutsy because we hadn't been there since (the previous Saturday). So we took a gamble trying to win it and it paid off."

Ronnie Capps and Steve Coleman of Tennessee finished 13th in the tournament, good enough to earn their second straight B'n'M Angler of the Year award. That was worth a fully rigged Ranger Boat valued at \$25,975.

The top area team was Steve Periotti and Stuart Baum of Calhoun who finished with 35.52 pounds for fifth place. Matt Saterfiel and Peyton Hemphill of West Monroe finished tenth with 34.90 pounds. Other local teams finishing in the Top 25 were Heath Rogers and Lance Bilberry of Farmerville in 19th; Jason Thomas of Monroe and Scotty Johnson of Ruston in 23rd; and Palmer Frost and Billy Rogers of Downsville in 24th.

D'Arbonne National Wildlife Refuge

D'Arbonne National Wildlife Refuge, located north of West Monroe, Louisiana, lies on the western edge of the Mississippi Alluvial Valley.

It was established in 1975 to protect bottomland hardwoods and provide wintering habitat for migratory waterfowl. Additionally the refuge provides habitat for alligators, bald eagles, the little known Rafinesque's big-eared bat and the endangered redcockaded woodpecker. The refuge is bisected by 13 miles of Bayou D'Arbonne, a stream in the Louisiana Natural and Scenic Rivers System, and is crisscrossed by numerous

Getting There ...

D'Arbonne National Wildlife Refuge is located in Ouachita and Union Parishes on either side of Bayou D'Arbonne near its confluence with the Ouachita River. Take White's Ferry Road (Louisiana 143) north out of West Monroe. This highway forms the eastern refuge boundary and there are seven access points with parking lots along the highway. The refuge complex headquarters is approximately 7 miles north of West Monroe at the intersection of Louisiana 143 and Holland's Bluff Road.





creeks, sloughs and oxbow lakes. Cypress swamps, bottomland hardwood and upland forests complete the landscape that is habitat for a diverse group of plants and animals. D'Arbonne NWR also has the national record mayhaw tree, a wetland species with fruit that makes delicious jelly. D'Arbonne is one of four refuges managed in the North Louisiana Refuges Complex.

In years of normal or above normal rainfall, the refuge's bottomland hardwood forest is a very important overflow area for the Ouachita River basin. High water levels, which usually occur between January and May, can flood up to 87% of the refuge.

The wetland forests not only provide habitat to wetland dependent wildlife, but they also reduce damage from flooding in developed areas, they filter silt and other particles from the water, they help neutralize pollutants in the water, and they provide recharge areas for aquifers (natural underground water storage areas).

Upper Ouachita National Wildlife Refuge

Upper Ouachita NWR, established in 1978, consists of 42,594 acres located in Union and Ouachita Parishes. The legislative purposes for the refuge are to conserve wetlands and manage for migratory birds. The refuge is bisected by the scenic Ouachita River and consists of upland pine-hardwood and bottomland hardwood forest; agriculture, moist-soil wetlands, and open water. Upper Ouachita NWR provides excellent wintering habitat for tens of thousands of ducks and geese. The endangered red-cockaded woodpecker and the threatened Louisiana black bear are found here. Other wildlife species that call the refuge home include alligators, deer, turkey, squirrels, bald eagles and beavers. Upper Ouachita NWR is one of the five refuges managed in the North Louisiana Refuges Complex.



Miles Waterways



Bayou de L'Outre or Bayou DeLoutre, is commonly referred to as "The Looter" by the locals.

Bayou de L'Outre's entire length (43 miles) flowing southeast from the Louisiana-Arkansas state line to its entrance into the Ouachita River is designated a scenic stream. The stream flows through a narrow band of bottomland hardwoods flanked by upland mixed pine-hardwoods and stands of loblolly pine. Since 90% of this outstanding natural resource is undeveloped, it fosters a highly natural, scenic setting. Freshwater fish and wildlife are optimum for the habitat carrying capacity. Several plant and animal species in the area are considered PRETS (Protected/ rare/endangered/threatened species). There is one prehistoric Native American site located on the stream, and the stream merits further study. The stream offers high quality canoeing opportunities, although access to the stretch is limited to bridge crossings and a commercial landing near the Ouachita River.

It is one of the few areas in the state with exposed rock along the stream. Cougar sightings have been reported by local residents.




Finch Lake

Finch Lake is a natural lake that was dammed up to control the water level. It is flooded annually by the Ouachita River, which adds to the great fishing. It is located in the Upper Ouachita National Wildlife Management area. This is a stumpy lake, best fished by small flat bottom aluminum boats or kayaks. This is a very nice place to paddle and there aren't any large boats because it is a stumpy lake. The small motor boats that are there go slow. The area around the lake is all natural because the lake is surrounded by the Upper Ouachita National Wildlife Management area.

The shore of the lake is surrounded by button willow and cypress trees. It is a duck sanctuary, and in the winter a paddler can get close to hundreds, sometimes thousands of ducks of all types. No guns are allowed, but a camera would be a good asset.

The lake is noted for its good fishing. Bass, bream and catfish are caught in the hot months. The locals run yo-yo's at night during the winter.





Bryan Park

Bryan Park began as a 35.6-acre plot of land donated by Bill Bryan and Sue Bryan. It is now a wonderful blend of nature, technology and conservation that make it one of Union Parish's unique treasures.

The park, located on Louisiana 151 in Downsville, was brought to life through a \$150,000 Land and Water Conservation grant and through a lot of hard work from local youth volunteers from both AmeriCorps VISTA and WIA Summer Youth.

Bryan Park features a picturesque 2.25 acre pond, surrounded by 6,600 feet of multi-use trails, and around 40 species of trees.

Follow an easy walking trail through bottomland hardwoods and mixed pine forest around the pond, where you may sight such nesting species as Black-throated Green or Black and White Warblers, Northern Parulas, and Red-shouldered and Cooper's Hawks. Wading birds such as Great Egret, Great Blue Heron, and Green Heron also frequent the pond and the cattail perimeter hosts Red-winged Blackbirds. In the warmer months, honeysuckle attracts Ruby-throated Hummingbirds. Wetland migrants include Marsh Wren and Common Yellowthroat in the



fall and spring. In the late winter until spring, Black Vultures court and cruise. Generally, the park boundaries are alive with Woodpeckers, Eastern Bluebirds, various Sparrows, Vireos, Indigo Buntings, Eastern Meadowlarks, Bobwhites, Mourning Dove, Northern Cardinals and Blue Jays. Owls are habitués.



Operation Round Up gives back to the community

Operation Round Up is a community service program that gives Claiborne Electric members the option to allow their bills to be rounded up to the next whole dollar. The difference in the actual bill and the rounded amount is deposited into the Operation Round Up Trust Fund. The funds accumulated are dispersed to charitable causes in the communities served by Claiborne Electric.


The program is governed by the Claiborne Electric Operation Round Up Trust Board. The board consists of nine Claiborne Electric members from across the Co-op's service area. The board receives and reviews applications for the funds, makes decisions about allocation, and disperses the funds accordingly.

Operation Round Up was originally created by Palmetto Electric Cooperative in South Carolina. After seeing the success of the program, other co-ops nationwide began starting their own programs. Today, more than 300 co-ops have an Operation Round Up program. Claiborne Electric founded its Operation Round Up Trust in the summer of 2007. Currently, Claiborne Electric has one of the highest member participation rates in the country, with more than 95 percent of its members voluntarily participating in the program.

Operation Round Up funds are used to assist area schools, fire departments, youth organizations, police departments, families whose homes have burned, libraries and museums, veterans efforts and elderly and disabled individuals, among many other worthy causes. One hundred percent of the money raised through Operation Round up stays in Claiborne Electric's service area.

Since the first grants were dispersed, the program has been used to award about 500 grants totaling more than \$1.5 million dollars to organizations and families in need across the six parishes served by the Co-op. In 2017, Operation Round Up donated more than \$130,000 to local causes. \$48,390.35 of that total was donated in Union Parish.

Through the end of 2018, 155 Operation Round Up grants had been awarded in Union Parish, totaling \$485,128.31.
